At a time when land reform is a burning issue for most of these countries, this penetrating sociological and economic analysis of the Spanish experience is particularly opportune. It examines the tensions within wage-labour latifundism and describes the value systems of both labourers and landowners. Profit-minded landowners should prefer to become rentier landlords but this would threaten the legitimacy of their position, which requires owner-operation. The labourers' behaviour conforms with their image of society: 'We who work' are in conflict with the landowning classes, but nevertheless 'we poor must work'. Includes a new chapter discussing Pitt-Rivers' and Hobsbawm's works on Andalusia, as well as dissecting Warriner's Land Reform in Principle and Practice.
