Again, if I had to point out the most noticeable changes in the old language, visible for instance in *Lasamon's Brut* at the beginning of the New Era, they would be as follows: The use of *a* or *an* (in the later text: *on*) as an article; the change of the Old English terminations *-a* and *-an* into *-e* and *-en*, as well as the disregard of inflections and genders; the masculine forms given to neuter nouns in the plural; the neglect of the feminine terminations of adjectives and pronouns,...

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
