The more important of these subjects was that dealing with the constitution and administration of the University of Toronto, and its alleged extravagant expenditure of the University Endowment, The agitation on these subjects, which commenced in 1860, culminated in 1863, in regard to Separate Schools, in the passage of a comprehensive measure, restoring certain Rights to the Supporters of these Schools, - the main principles of which were afterwards embodied in the Confederation Act of 1867. The University Question, being a much more difficult subject to deal with, was first referred to a Select Committee of the House of Assembly, which, not being able to agree upon a Report, the Government...
